

Given below are the various initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly:

- Energy conservation: For the conservation of energy, incandescent lamps have been replaced with CFLs and LEDs. It is mandatory for the students and staff to switch off computers, electricity equipments when not in use, ACs, lights and fans immediately after use.
- Use of renewable energy: For the last 20 years we have been using solar water heating system for the hostel and the college campus. Four solar lights have also been installed in the campus.
- Water harvesting: Rain water harvesting plant has been installed in the college campus & in the hostel to preserve rain water which otherwise goes waste.
- ✤ Water recycling: College has a Sewerage Treatment Plant (STP). The water treated in this plant is used for watering in the campus. Sprinklers are used for watering trees and plants which help in reducing water wastage.
- Efforts for carbon neutrality: In order to reduce the carbon level in the college campus, trees and herbal plants like Neem, Harshinghar, Tulsi, Sadabahar, Giloey are planted in the college.
- No Mobile Zone: Certain areas of the college are marked as 'No Mobile Zone' to maintain discipline and to reduce noise pollution as well as the pollution caused by harmful radiations.
- Plantation: College has a beautiful lush green campus adorned with flowers and plants of many types.
- Waste management: Measures are taken to manage various types of waste generated in the campus. A Vermi-Composting plant has been set-up in the college to manage waste from the canteen and hostel mess.
